Global Women's Studies at the National University of Ireland Galway is advertising for two funded PhD positions, one with a background in macro-economics or related discipline and one with a background in sociology or related discipline, for a DfID funded study on the costs (social and economic) of violence against women and girls. Project description: The project undertaken by NUI Galway, in collaboration with Ipsos MORI and ICRW and funded by the Department for International Development, UK, takes a multi-disciplinary, mixed methods approach that integrates quantitative and qualitative research with innovative economic analysis to derive social and economic costs of violence against women and girls (VAWG) in three countries. It is the third component in the What Works to Prevent Violence programme.

We are recruiting for two PhDs, one with a background in macro-economics, development economics or related discipline, the other with a background in sociology or related discipline. The PhD student will undertake research examining the costs of violence against women and girls in Ghana, South Sudan or Pakistan.

Stipend: €23, 000 inclusive of fees for 3 years.

Entry Requirements: The PhD fellowship will be awarded on a competitive basis and applicants will be expected to demonstrate both a strong academic background and aptitude for research.

Duration: Funded for 3 years (Structured PhD), full-time with Global Women's Studies.
